PART 1: CONTEXT & CRITICAL ANALYSIS

(Based on the Prologue by Rita María Tejada and historical/literary studies of the Dominican Republic)

1. CÉSAR NICOLÁS PENSON: A NINETEENTH-CENTURY DOMINICAN MAN OF LETTERS:

Multifaceted Career:

César Nicolás Penson (1855-1901) was a prominent Dominican intellectual, journalist, and lawyer, deeply involved in the civic and literary life of Santo Domingo. He pioneered daily publications in the Dominican Republic and left a significant mark on its 19th-century literary landscape.

"Cosas Añejas" as a Landmark Work:

Published in 1891, *Cosas Añejas* is considered one of the most representative works of 19th-century Dominican literature and Penson's magnum opus.

2. THE GENRE OF "TRADICIONES" AND NATIONAL IDENTITY:

Rescue of the Past:

Cosas Añejas belongs to the "tradiciones" genre, akin to Ricardo Palma's *Tradiciones Peruanas*. These narratives aim to preserve the past, collecting popular tales, legends, and customs from oral tradition and historical archives.

Blend of Fact and Fiction:

Penson, like Palma, skillfully weaves together historical events, real figures, popular superstitions, and personal anecdotes, creating a "novelized history" that captures the spirit of the Dominican people and their environment.

"Tradition" as Defined by Penson:

Penson defined tradition as a particular event, perhaps known to few, that gains "prestigious charm" over time or due to its inherent importance, distinguishing it from merely modern occurrences.

3. IDEOLOGICAL CURRENTS: ANTI-HAITIANISM AND HISPANOPHILIA:

Pervasive Anti-Haitianism:

A central and controversial theme is the strong anti-Haitian sentiment of the era, which Penson reflects. This attitude, rooted in the historical Haitian occupation of the eastern part of the island (1822-1844), portrays Haitians with negative stereotypes as "savage" and a threat to Dominican identity.

Hispanophilia and Patriotism:

In contrast to anti-Haitianism, Penson's work often exalts a filiation towards Spain ("Madre Patria"), viewing it as a protector of European values and a counterpoint to



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perceived Haitian "barbarism." This Hispanophilia, while seemingly nostalgic, serves to reinforce a particular vision of Dominican nationality.

Social and Political Commentary:

Penson uses his narratives to comment on contemporary political life, social customs, and economic changes, often expressing conservative views and criticizing liberal governments while advocating for order and progress.

4. LANGUAGE, STYLE, AND HISTORICAL DETAIL:

Rich and Eclectic Language:

Penson's writing features a rich linguistic palette, combining cultured language with popular phrases, regionalisms, proverbs, and foreign expressions, reflecting the linguistic diversity of his time.

Vivid Descriptions:

The narratives are notable for their meticulous descriptions of 18th and 19th-century Santo Domingo's urban landscapes, architecture, fashion, food, and daily life, providing a valuable historical document.

Author's Annotations:

A distinctive feature of *Cosas Añejas* is Penson's own extensive notes, clarifying vocabulary, historical facts, and cultural references, which are integrated into this edition for enhanced accessibility.
